At Long Last, Jericho Historical Center Reopens!

The Jericho Historical Center reopened on Sunday, July 14 after several years of restoration. It was an event celebrated by neighbors and friends alike. Among her many roles on this memorable occasion, Dawn Dellner, the Chair of the Jericho Committee, greeted a special and unexpected visitor Captain Theophilus Baker.

The Captain arrived to see what all the commotion was about. The former owner, who built the house now known as Jericho in 1801, had been resting peacefully in the cemetery of the South Dennis Congregational Church for over 220 years. He was delighted to attend!

Although an experienced Ship Master, Master of Ceremonies was a new role, but one to which he quickly adapted! Much to everyone's delight, he warmly welcomed everyone to the event and introduced a stellar array of speakers which included: Phil Catchings - President of the Dennis Historical Society, Paul McCormick – Town of Dennis Selectboard, Chris Flanagan - State Representative and Dawn Dellner - Jericho Historical Center Director.

More than 90 neighbors and visitors attended, and they were delighted with the day's activities!

The House and Barn were open for tours from 10 am to 3 pm. Visitors enjoyed the new exhibits in both buildings, especially the Driftwood Zoo in the Barn, revived under the artistic direction of Dee Collins with help from members of the Friends of Jericho, and the Before and After Pictures of the Restoration Project that was generously funded by the Community Preservation Committee.

Following that event, Captain Baker invited guests around to the front of the house to admire the unique and detailed architecture surrounding the front door. He was eager to show everyone this feature that had been so expertly restored. It was a photo opportunity many could not resist.

The Jericho Committee is grateful for the support and hard work of the many individuals and groups involved in the restoration project. The Committee members and other volunteers will be welcoming visitors for tours throughout the summer on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1-4 pm.



Righting a 100 Year Old Wrong

During the week of July 15, 2024, the Dennis Memorial Library celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the dedication of its original building. The week's activities culminated on Thursday the 18th with an *invitation only* gathering hosted by the library's trustees to celebrate the anniversary by saying thank you to the staff, volunteers and donors who collectively make the library the incredible community asset that it is today!

A highlight of the evening was the dedication of a new plaque which is now in the library's entryway. On a table as one enters, is a handout which is reproduced below explaining why the trustees wanted the new plaque to accompany the original. The words in the handout were extracted from the *welcome/thank you/plaque/enjoy* talk made by the chair of the trustees.





When the building was dedicated in 1924, a plaque was installed. Previously located above the mantel in the original building, it is now in the entry way. The Memorial in the library's name is to honor and remember those from Dennis who served their country during the Great War. The plaque was given by Dennis Grange No. 260.

Our research has revealed that only members of the Grange are on the plaque. The names of twenty Dennis veterans are missing!

Tonight, the library is correcting an oversight which goes back 100 years. Tonight, a new plaque is unveiled in the entry way above the original which addresses a century old injustice. As of today, the Dennis Memorial Library is finally honoring all ninety-six of those from Dennis who served their country during World War I and living up to its name.

A New Look at Cape Cod


Late in June, the following email came in to the DHS Website -


